In 2018, we faced many challenges, but we also were able to make great strides in expanding services and access to care in our communities. Committed as an independent, locally governed, community healthcare system, we continue to focus on the most critical needs facing the people we serve. We remain stable and financially-strong as we continue to grow and invest in the future, while also delivering vital services, innovative approaches and solutions to the

complex health challenges facing us today. We exist exclusively to care for our communities, and we continue to grow and thrive because of the support of our region.

We made significant progress in expanding our services and improving access to resources across our entire service area. At Athol Hospital, the new medical office building and state-of-the-art emergency department rose from the ground, creating the shape of things to come. We opened a Walk-In Care clinic at Tully Family Medicine, providing access to services seven days a week. In April, in collaboration with McLean Hospital, the Quabbin Retreat opened a 40-bed, adult residential program, helping adults deal with mental health and substance misuse issues. At Heywood Hospital, we continue to grow our medical staff, including expanding our surgical offerings as we prepare for future enhancements of our surgical suites.

Perhaps, our most important work happens outside the walls of our hospitals and medical offices - in our schools and in our communities. We continue along this path as we develop Handle With Care, a program to address issues stemming from childhood trauma.

Today, Heywood Healthcare is investing in the community as well as the facilities of Heywood Hospital, Athol Hospital and Quabbin Retreat. These programs and services reach our diverse community outside our campuses to connect people to vital resources and care, and improve the overall health and wellbeing of the thousands of families who call the North Central and Quabbin towns "home".

Heywood School-Based Care Coordination Program

Stabilizing students and families for healthier todays and brighter futures

How do you improve a community? By linking students and parents to the supports they need to steady their lives. By empowering teens to stay in school and develop hope for the future. By a partnership of schools, hospitals and families to meet complex challenges with solutions that address underlying conditions.

Heywood Healthcare's collaborations with schools connect youth and families to services to help regain stability, address behavioral health needs and bring medical care to youth. With commitments to a successful School Based Care Coordinator program and expanding School Based Health Centers, we are building a healthier community.

School Based Care Coordinators: Linking youth and families to services

In place at eight schools, the School Based Care Coordinator (SBCC) program uses a multi-disciplinary team approach to support students' social, emotional and behavioral learning to positively impact students and the overall health of the school system and the greater community.

The program hosts Care Coordinators in the schools to provide hands-on case management to identify needs, work with families, and connect students to clinical counseling and community-based resources. At its core, the SBCC program offers in-school access to behavioral therapy either face-to-face or using video teleconferencing. Barriers including lack of transportation, parental schedules or unavailability often keep students from connecting with these vital therapeutic services.

In addition to managing behavioral health support for students, the SBCC also coordinates wrap-around services to tackle instabilities at home such as substance abuse, domestic violence, food or fuel instability, trauma or homelessness. Working with school personnel, they identify risks, determine family needs and help to navigate community-based resources, providing awareness and advocacy for youth and families. They communicate with school and community professionals and serve as a liaison between staff and family to support whole family approach to care delivery.

Heywood has a lengthy history of supporting youth in school settings. Established in 2001, the Murdock School Based Health Center in Winchendon has supported over 80% of middle and high school student body, providing acute and behavioral healthcare services delivered by an on-site Nurse Practitioner and Community Health Worker.

Offering clinical services in the schools significantly heightens access to meet medical needs in underserved communities. The Murdock School Based Health Center was the first school based health center in the North Central Region and now serves as the platform for the hybrid School Based Care Coordination programs now operating in Gardner, Athol, Orange, and Templeton.

The results of these programs is clear and measurable: emotional health improves, attendance improves, behavior improves and grades improve. Students are happier and healthier, classrooms are more conducive to learning; teachers can focus on teaching. Our students succeed, our schools become better, and the community grows stronger as our youth complete high school and go on to become healthier adults.

Securing the future of local healthcare providers

Lectures and book learning are part of studying for a medical profession, but healthcare isn't delivered on paper, and the skills of interacting with people and creating positive care experiences for patients can't be learned in a classroom.

Clinical rotations, internships and observation at Heywood Healthcare help area students to apply theoretical learning and witness first-hand the dynamic nature of a hospital setting. They also provide the hospital with potential employees who have been well-trained and have an understanding of the processes, culture and value of the community hospital.

Krystal Flagg wanted to be a nurse since she was ten years old. The Gardner native graduated from Mount Wachusett Community College's nursing program last spring. She was thrilled to be assigned to Heywood Hospital for her medical-surgical clinical rotation. "The staff at Heywood provided a welcoming environment where I could begin applying all I learned. Everyone is very team-oriented and supportive of each other – including the students. It made me more confident and comfortable as I began working with patients."

"Heywood Hospital is unique in the experience it gives students," says Joyce Fletcher, RN, MSN, Clinical Instructor at Mount Wachusett Community College, who guides the nursing students through their clinical rotations at Heywood Hospital. "As I walk through Heywood Hospital, I see many former students who are on staff. Staff truly embrace the clinical students and encourage them to be part of the team as they gain their practical experience in the hospital. It provides the students with a chance to apply what they know and introduces them to the family-feel that Heywood has."

Students who have an exceptional experience on clinical rotation at Heywood often seek employment there when they graduate. Both student and staff have gotten to know each other. Rotations give students the clinical training they need and an understanding of what it's like to work there.

When Krystal passed her nursing boards, there was only one place she wanted to be a nurse: in a community hospital setting where compassion and innovation come together to provide the best possible care. She now works at a place with same values and commitment to caring that she has – Heywood Hospital.

Inspiring Careers in Healthcare

The healthcare sector offers a range of rewarding professional careers with growth opportunities and the ability to positively impact the community. The Heywood Healthcare Internship Program provides area college students with opportunities to gain valuable experience in the healthcare field. Internships are designed to encourage students to consider careers in science, medicine and public health.

Students are offered internships, observerships, clinical rotations and other experiences to aid them in understanding the healthcare setting, learning in a supportive environment, introducing them to mentors and developing contacts and working relationships with experienced personnel in their field.

The community healthcare setting offers a wide variety of medical services, making it ideal for learning and enhancing skills. With new, state-of-the-art innovations and advances in care, Heywood Hospital and Athol Hospital are ideal places to gain experience – from clinical services to health information technology. Partnering with the local colleges and universities, the program offers valuable work experience and observational opportunities that help students pursue careers in science, medicine and public health.

Handle with Care

Supporting youth through adversity

As a community hospital system, our directives and focus are determined by the specific health needs in the communities which we serve. The 2018 Community Health Assessment identified a critical need to address one of the most prevalent issues facing the youth in our region – the detrimental impact of childhood trauma.

Adverse childhood experiences (ACES) include family economic distress, incarceration, death or divorce of parents, violence in the home and neighborhood, living with those who are depressed, suicidal or addicted to drugs or alcohol, and racial or ethnic prejudice. Children exposed to ACES face significantly higher risks for negative health outcomes, behavioral issues, academic failure and incarceration. The risk elevates with each ACES experience.

Contributing Factors in Our Community

Our service area witnesses some of the highest rates of the leading causes of ACES, often double or triple Massachusetts State averages. Contributing factors include poverty, domestic and interpersonal violence, violent assaults and weapons related deaths, mental health disorders, suicide and substance misuse. In Athol and Gardner alone, fifty percent of students enrolled have had one or more ACES. Our service area has the State's highest rates of child maltreatment – affecting more than 3,700 children. And 91% of the 800+ children in State placement came from homes with substance abuse or neglect.

The challenges facing our most vulnerable families are complex; however, we can lessen the impact of these traumatic events on children.

Handled with Care

Handle with Care is an evidence-based, collaborative program that mitigates the effects of adverse childhood experiences through a community-based support system. This proven model promotes school-community partnerships aimed at ensuring that children who are exposed to trauma in their home, school or community receive appropriate interventions and support to help them achieve academically and grow personally.

Handle with Care engages police, first responders, emergency departments, primary care physicians and courts to identify children who have been exposed to a traumatic event. They communicate confidentially with schools, and a school-based care coordinator (SBCC) or counselor follows up with families for permission to connect their child to counseling services in an effort to preempt emotional and behavioral difficulties. The students receive assessments and testing by school-based counselors to determine treatment, accommodations and other techniques to aid the student. Teachers and the schools incorporate interventions to help support the student while the SBCC provides support for families to access community-based resources and assistance.

> Developed by the West Virginia Center for Children's Justice, Massachusetts Advocates for Children, Harvard Law School and the Task Force on Children Affected by Domestic Violence, Handle with Care has been successfully used in cities nationwide since 2013.





Confidence in our community

Since its creation, communities implementing Handle with Care experienced positive impacts on the lives of their children and the learning environment:

- Increased students ability to focus and learn which promoted increased academic achievement, improved attendance and graduation rates
- Improved school climate which reduced staff and student stress, and improved teacher satisfaction and retention
- Reduced student outbursts, disruptive behaviors and disciplinary action such as detentions and suspensions
- Reduced student bullying and harassment and increased student resilience

Together we will impact the lives of our youth – together we can positively change our community.

- Support from the community will help secure the funding needed to activate the Handle with Care program and reach children across the entire area served by both Heywood and Athol Hospitals.
- Handle with Care will use the infrastructure of Regional Behavioral Health Collaborative and existing staff to develop the systems and implement programs.

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

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
